The Pastor's Message

Greetings!

We have a lot to celebrate in this little church! Despite a snowstorm that prevented us from meeting on of the Sundays in January, people have been coming to worship and our boards and committees are up and running. Of particular note is your response to our annual Stewardship Appeal. Members and Friends *just like you* have pledged \$32,470 to help cover the operating expenses of our church in the coming year. This breaks down to approximately \$35 each week per pledging unit! It is the highest amount pledged since prepandemic times, in fact, since 2018. Yes, we have a lot to celebrate!

February, for all its bleakness, all its cold, grey days, is also a rich month. It begins with Groundhog Day, which we know has little effect upon how quickly we will emerge from winter, but which we nevertheless observe in the hope that, in some strange way, even a groundhog can have an effect on the forces that determine our lives. Wednesday, February 14 is Valentine's Day. It is only fitting that if we have National Pickle Week and National

Pancake Month, we should set aside one day in the year to celebrate the mysterious power of love!

This year, Valentine's Day coincides with Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is a day of reflection and repentance. It (hopefully) leads us into an experience of forgiveness and healing and the new life that we celebrate through Easter. Perhaps on some deep level, love and repentance are connected. Sunday, February 18 is the first Sunday in Lent. Although the United Parishes of Southborough clergy were, once again, unable to get their act together in planning the Lenten series that so many of us fondly remember, we as a church need to find ways to engage with this deeply meaningful liturgical season. If you have any suggestions of things we can do in our church, please let me know.

Sunday, February 25, following our worship service and a luncheon, we will hold our Annual Meeting. I believe this is the 158th time our little church has gathered for an annual meeting. The annual meeting is a reminder that the polity of our church is grounded in democracy; the power lies with the people. This church polity is an expression of our belief that God, who is present within each and every one of us, speaks through each and every one of us and uses our gifts of time, talent, and treasure to guide the unfolding of the church.

We hope you will be with us in the weeks to come as we move toward the new life that emerges in the spring and to the resurrection experience of Easter!

The Church in the World

We are deeply saddened by the tragic loss of life, both Ukrainian and Russian soldiers and civilians on both sides caused by Putin's invasion of Ukraine. The people of Ukraine are fighting against tremendous numbers to hold onto their homeland and their national identity. They need our prayers and support.

We are also deeply saddened by the tragic loss of life in the Middle East as the animosity between Israel and the Palestinian peoples continues unabated. We condemn the recent terrorist attack of Hamas on Israel, the taking of Israeli hostages, and also the genocide that is unfolding as Israel turns Gaza into a wasteland. These peoples need to live together in peace as two sovereign peoples with strong, secure borders and a relationship that is marked by mutual respect and international cooperation, if not friendship. War is not the answer!

We recently received a request from our own Mattie Cummings that we pray for the people of Haiti. As you may know, our church helps support a little church and school in Haiti that Mattie helped found and which she continues to support. At the present time, approximately 80% of Haiti's capital Port-au-Prince, is under the control of rival gangs. Two weeks ago, six Roman Catholic nuns and two laypeople were kidnapped by one of these gangs and are still being held for ransom. We need to pray for the people who have been kidnapped, for the captors' change of heart, and for the people of Haiti, the poorest country in the western hemisphere, whose lives are continually upended by social and political unrest.

And we as a church need to continue to do all we can to support Mattie, Pastor Laurenson, and his people as they try to bring the Word of God and the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ to a people who desperately need it.
