The Pastor's Message

Greetings!

I was going to say that it wasn't really a bad winter, but as I write this message the temperature outside has once again dropped into the low 20's and the wind has moved a step past brisk and invigorating! I still think it wasn't a bad winter, though I find myself longing to be surrounded by green, to see leaves once again filling out the trees that grace the side of the road. Winter can be cold, stark, and grey. Consecutive days without sunshine can wear us down. I remind myself that this is why we live here in New England: we love the change of the seasons, even when, as has been the case recently, we experience a change of seasons several times within a given week.

Of course, it's also possible that we brave the long cold winter months here in New England simply because we're stupid!

I'll go with loving the change of the seasons! I'll go with celebrating the tulips and daffodils pushing their little heads out of the frozen ground. I'll go with celebrating the buds emerging on the trees, the change to Daylight Savings Time when we feel we have been "given" some extra hours of sunlight, the gentle warmth of spring that leads us outside our bunkers to engage with other people, nature, and life. I confess that even though winter wears me down as I become a little long in the tooth, it makes spring all the more special. New life! Life returning from the bare and barren ground! A reminder of the beauty and power of resurrection!

Easter comes "early" this year. We are already in the third week of Lent. Our sanctuary is graced with deep purple paraments, and the stark wooden cross constructed by David Crane and decorated every year by Darlene Sanderson. We soon move through the triumphal celebration of Palm Sunday to the somber experience of the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday to the darkness of Good Friday. Then we gather by the side of the lake in Hopkinton for our United Parishes of Southborough Easter sunrise service followed by our own celebration of Easter in this sanctuary! Throughout the next few weeks, the texture of our worship, the celebration of this special week in Jesus' life, mirrors our own movement through the sorrows and joys of life, hopefully ending with resurrection, with new life!

Be with us in the weeks to come as we move toward the new life that emerges in the spring and to the resurrection experience of Easter!

Then we go upstairs to the sanctuary for a communion service set in the context of the ancient order of Tenebrae. During this service, six readers will lead us through the events of Holy Week. This service is quiet, contemplative, and powerful. Some of our people have likened it to our Christmas Eve service in the depth of its meaning.

Sunday, March 31 – Easter Sunday!

Parishioners from all the churches in Southborough will gather by the lake in Hopkinton at 6:30 a.m. for an Easter sunrise service. Reverend Sanderson will be sharing the message this year. Our church will serve as a backup in case of inclement weather.

Our regular Easter Sunday worship service, with its special music, will take place in our beautifully decorated sanctuary at 11:00 a.m. There will be no coffee hour following worship.

We have concluded our study of the 13th century German mystic Meister Eckhart with Matthew Fox's comparison of Eckhart and C. G. Jung's teachings about God and the human soul. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you to all who responded to our Stewardship Appeal by pledging to support First Community Church for the coming year! As of the time of our annual meeting, members of our church family have pledged \$31,280 to the General Fund (our operating expenses) for the coming year. This represents an increase of \$1,600, 5.4% higher than it was in 2023! The number of pledging units also increased by 1 to a total of 17. The *average* amount pledged per week for the coming year will be \$35.38—an excellent degree of support for a church of our size and demographic!

BTW, this is the highest amount pledged since 2018! We are now back higher than we were when we entered into the pandemic shutdown!

BTW, it's not too late for YOU to make your pledge! We still need to draw from our Investment Fund each year to cover the deficit. Whatever you can do to help will be greatly appreciated!

BTW, this past year the members of our church contributed \$4,080 to our twelve mission recipients!

The Church in the World

We are deeply saddened by the tragic loss of life, both Ukrainian and Russian soldiers and civilians on both sides caused by Putin's invasion of Ukraine. We are also deeply saddened by the tragic loss of life in the Middle East as the animosity between Israel and the Palestinian peoples continues unabated. We condemn the recent terrorist attack of Hamas on Israel, the taking of Israeli hostages, and also the genocide that is unfolding as Israel turns Gaza into a wasteland. These two peoples need to live together in peace as two sovereign peoples with strong, secure borders and a relationship that is marked by mutual respect and international cooperation, if not friendship.
